

Colonel (RET) Robert E. Chevas selected for President Elect Position!

Colonel (RET) Robert E. Chevas retired from the United States Army on 28 February 2014 after 36 years of commissioned service. COL Chevas served on Army active duty status from 1980-1990. His assignments included serving as the Training Officer for the 130th Engineer Brigade in Hanau, Germany and as the Training Officer of the 528th USAAG in Cakmakli, Turkey.

After his active service, COL Chevas returned to the United States by serving in the Army Reserve. His assignments include serving as the S-1 Officer for the 372nd Engineer Group and the 73rd Combat Support Hospital in the 88th Regional Support Command. Following those assignments, COL Chevas was the Chemical Officer and Training Officer for the 416th ENCOM. In that assignment, he was mobilized and served as the Operations Officer, Military Liaison Team, Lithuania. COL Chevas also served as the Plans Officer and later the G3 Officer for the 308th Civil Affairs Brigade. During that assignment, he was mobilized and assigned as the Chief, J9, Operations and Plans, KFOR in Pristina, Kosovo. COL Chevas then served as Command Historian, Headquarters European Command (EUCOM) in Stuttgart, Germany.

COL Chevas then served as the Training Officer for the 416th Theater Engineer Command. He was the selected to command the 372nd Engineer Brigade, Fort Snelling, MN. COL Chevas' last assignment was the G2 for the 416th Theater Engineer Command.

CHANGE IN PAYMENT PROCESSING

Effective 1 October 2020, the 416th ENCOM Association changed our merchant service provider. Online payments, purchases, and donations (hint, hint), will now be processed through Affinipay versus PayPal. Affinipay is affiliated with Wild Apricot, our web hosting provider. Reasons for the change include:

- The primary reason for this change was to avoid the additional \$108 annual fee charged by Wild Apricot when using a third-party merchant service provider.
- There are no monthly or setup fees.
- Members and others are not directed to a third-party site to complete their payments. PayPal Express Checkout and PayPal Payments Standard process the payment from a PayPal site.
- Wild Apricot Payments/AffiniPay will deposit funds automatically into our bank account. PayPal accumulates funds until we manually transfer them to our account.
- PayPal deducts its service fees from our funds *before* depositing into your bank account. While Wild Apricot Payments/AffiniPay deposits all of our funds and then withdraws its fees each month from your bank account.
- One-stop support for both Wild Apricot software and Wild Apricot Payments.

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Colonel (R) John A. P. Gessner: Vice President for Programs and Activities

As other important veteran and military activities are announced throughout the year, the VP for Programs and Activities is responsible for getting the word out to the membership.

John has been on the ENCOM board for 9 years and has served as the President and a Director at Large. During his term as President, he and the board worked closely with the TEC to develop and construct the Fallen Heroes Memorial Wall, culminating in a dedication ceremony in May 2015.

John's tour with the 416th Engineer Command began in March 1995 when he joined the Engineer Section as a Project Engineer and later, as an engineer team leader. In 1996, he deployed to Saudi Arabia with an Engineer Augmentation Team to assist the 3rd Army Engineer with recovery efforts following the Khobar Tower bombing. Other deployments included Bright Star 1997 and 2005 in Egypt and the Hurricane Mitch Recovery in Honduras in 1999. In 2002, he deployed to Kuwait in support of Operation Enduring Freedom, forward deploying to Bagram Air Base as the Base Engineer. He further participated in the opening months of Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2003. His last positions with the 416th TEC were as the G-7 Deputy Chief of Staff, Engineer and G-3 operations.

Returning to active duty in 2007, he served as the United States Army Corps of Engineers Liaison Officer to the Customs and Border Protection under the Department of Homeland Security. His duties included designing and constructing several border patrol station expansions to handle the 2000 agent increase and to work with the Engineer Construction and Support Office (ECSO) to construct 660 miles of border wall and barriers along the United States southwest border. He retired from active duty in April 2010 with 32 years of service. His military awards include the Legion of Merit, 2 Bronze Stars, 4 MSMs, the Department of Homeland Security Achievement Medal, and the Corps of Engineers Silver and Bronze de Fleury Medals.

He currently works as the Program Manager for Versar Inc, providing engineering, environmental and professional services to the 88th Readiness Division, Fort McCoy, WI. His business footprint covers 19 states and includes over 280 facilities assigned to the United States Army Reserve (USAR). His post retirement activities include former USAR Ambassador, Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve (ESGR) Military Outreach Coordinator and Assistant State Chaplain for the Wisconsin American Legion. He resides in Sparta, WI with his wife Dawn, of 41 years. He and Dawn have 3 married children and 6 grandchildren.

Lieutenant Colonel (R) Robert E. Mittelstaedt: Newsletter Editor and Historian

LTC Robert E. Mittelstaedt's military career covered 24.5 years and offered a wide variety of engineer experiences at the battalion, TAACOM, FORSCOM and ENCOM levels and retired in 1994. He accepted an early retirement offer as life took on a new direction or two.

LTC Mittelstaedt misses the pace and activities of active military life, He spends most of his time working with the Ohio Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve (ESGR) working up to a Regional Chair position, and is still an active member. He works in my brother's law office dealing with Veterans Affairs paperwork and accounting.

Bob keeps active while reading and staying up with military affairs. He is a life member of the Reserve Officers Association (ROA), Association of the U.S. Army (AUSA), Air Force Association (AFA), and Navy League of the U.S. (NLUS), Military Officer Association of America (MOAA), The Army Engineer Association (AEA), and the National Defense Industrial Association (NDIA). Other annual memberships he's involved with include the American Legion (27 years) and the Sovereign Military Order of the Temple of Jerusalem (SMOTJ) for 10 years.

During the three years from 1996 thru 1998, Mittelstaedt worked as the Assistant Director of the American Center of Oriental Research (ACOR) in Amman, Jordan, a research 501(c) (3) institute located near the University of Jordan, specializing in archaeological research. In the process, he earned a Master of Arts in Archaeology and Heritage from the University of Leicester, UK in 2002.

LTC Mittelstaedt for twenty years worked in various positions as a volunteer staff member for Wadi Thamad Survey and Excavations (an archaeological field school with 20 to 55 students) near Madaba, Jordan during the summer months. It was sponsored by Wilfrid Laurier University of Waterloo, Ontario, Canada. Starting as a photographer and excavator, him responsibilities changed to eventually becoming the camp manager, photographer, teacher and problem solver until the project was halted in 2012. After the project closed, he looked south and started doing surveys of the Eastern Desert of Egypt with a geologist who was finishing a book on mines and quarries in 2013. He has been working with the Gebel Silsila Excavation and Survey project on the Nile between Aswan and Luxor. It is a large quarry site with quarries, tombs, temples, etc. Five to six months have been spent in Egypt, supporting the Swedish University of Lund sponsored excavation since 2014 and am on hold because of COVID-19. The geological surveys are also on hold at this time.






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WHAT IT'S LIKE BEING A NURSE WORKING ON THE FRONT LINES OF COVID-19

COVID-19 and Battle Assemblies:

Covid-19 changed the meaning of Battle Assemblies. The need to eliminate gatherings and personal contact promoted emphasis upon personal training and On-Line Training. The new term is VBAs or Virtual Battle Assemblies. Travel restrictions also forced these revisions to the meaning of Training Time. There are many options for personal training including using the computer. Suggestions are: Physical Training; On-Line Courses (civilian); Army Professional Development; Army Training Network (ATN); the Digital Training Management Program; Yellow Ribbon Reintegration Program (YRRP) Virtual Events and Soldier/Family Resiliency Training.

Although the Chief of the Army Reserve put Virtual Battle Assemblies in place and much of training is on hold, the individual responsibilities to maintain normal readiness standards has not changed, Individuals need to maintain physical fitness, medical readiness and other administrative requirements of their commands. On-Line resources are available for almost every area of military training and personnel management. The chain of command is still in place, just virtually, with available support and resources, as needed. Supervisors are still responsible for validating individual training and administrative actions. COVID-19 has made normal training days, more challenging to supervise, document, record and guide efforts of the individual soldiers. **Training emphasizes the Individual now!**





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Closed Hospital Converted to an Alternate Care Center

MELROSE, Ill. – A team from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), along with additional Soldiers, and contractors had less than three weeks to convert a hospital to an Alternate Care Facility (ACF) that can hold a total 430 beds.

Time was an extremely important factor, as varying levels of patient care would be needed immediately due to novel corona virus disease response.

Sgt. Maj. John Nelson, 416th Theater Engineer Command, Darien, and Sgt. Maj. Steven Lotz, 86th Training Division, Arlington Heights, both arrived April 6 to assist USACE, along with contractors, all tasked to rehabilitate what was formerly Westlake Hospital, and turn it into an ACF.

Initially, Lotz said he thought there might be communication differences between the USACE and civilian contractor relationship; the general contractor, Bulley and Andrews hadn't worked with USACE since 1944. However, that was not the case. "They all went into this dedicated, and strived to make the deadline while doing a professional job," said Lotz. "Everyone worked side-by-side and understood the mission to be accomplished."

The two sergeants major were tasked to provide quality assurance and quality control of contracted work covering a wide range of construction disciplines including mechanical, electrical, and plumbing systems. The pair of reserve engineer soldiers also assisted with the management to the repairs and upgrades of the heating, cooling, and building automation systems.

"My experience working in the same role for USACE in Afghanistan was helpful, because I was familiar with the systems and procedures USACE uses to manage construction," said Nelson, an engineer from the 416th's general engineering operations cell (GENOC), with several years of experience in both the Army Reserve, and in his civilian career.

"Definitely beyond satisfied with the results, and how quickly everyone got this facility up and, running in the short suspense of time given," said Lotz. "Was glad to be part of this project!"

Nelson explained that the Westlake Alternate Care Facility was turned over to the State of Illinois and the Illinois National Guard April 25, 2020. They will furnish the building, and finish preparations for COVID-19 patients.

The moniker ACF is important to reveal, because this will not be considered a hospital, and will not intake new patients on a walk-in status. Patients will be checked in at hospitals throughout the Chicago area, and then transferred, by ambulance, to the ACF to mitigate overcrowding due to COVID-19.

Your experiences should not be lost. Take a few moments to write up or even just outline your thoughts and record memories over a couple weeks, fill in the details and complete your story/s. The Museum would like to collect your story and might publish it in the "On Point: The Journal of Army History." Do you feel your story is not significant enough? Let the Museum Staff review your work and make that decision. Do you feel you are not comfortable enough to write an article? See assistance then from friends or other members of this Association for support before submitting your article to the Museum. Perhaps you have photographs or can sketch scenes to support your article. It can give you a good feeling to have your experiences recognized and published so that many other Army personnel or supporters can appreciate your experiences. Even if not published in the Journal, your experiences will be preserved in the Museum Archives for future researchers.

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U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs VA Healthcare Application Process

In these slow moving COVID-19 times, there is an opportunity to take care of some items that members might have put off during busier times. Are you entitled to Veterans Administration (VA) Health Care Benefits? Applications are easy to prepare and establish your eligibility and get your healthcare for yourself as well as your dependents. See the process summary below and the one form required.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION (VA) HEALTH CARE APPLICATION PROCESS:

The application for Veterans Health Care is rather simple to apply for. Below is an outline of the process but the easiest way to approach the process is to go to <www.VA.gov>. Under Health Care select "Apply Now for VA Health Care" and follow the prompts.

The process consists of 4 stages: a) Gather your needed information (DD214, Most Recent Federal Tax Return, Social Security number and dependent documentation, Insurance Programs and numbers, VA Disability Rating and any other specialized, related documents that relate to other VA benefits or programs that might impact your application for health care benefits; b) Complete a on-line form VA Form-10 EZ <www.va.gov/vaforms/medical/pdf/10-10EZ-fillable.pdf> and print copies. Questions on completion, phone (877) 222-8387; your local county or state Veterans Service Officer (VSO) can also assist you. c) Mail form to Veterans Administration, Health Eligibility Center, 2957 Clairmont Road, Suite 200, Atlanta, GA 30329; d) Make weekly follow-up calls until response is obtained Phone: (877) 222-8387, Ext 2; and e) Locate nearest VA medical facility and set up an appointment.

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Military Officers Association of America

Many of us know the MOAA organization, might be members and are aware it is one of the leading organizations watching the legislative progress or regression as budgets are passed and monies expended. It is our watchdog, of sorts, as it sees itself as the protector of the military personnel and a guardian of the national defense of our country. It does all that and more. It sees itself as becoming the leading association advocating on behalf of the uniformed services. Its mission is to positively advocate for the uniformed services. Its dedication is to never stop serving.

As we have found out after retirement, many of us still never stop serving. Your membership in the 416th ENCOM Association is evidence of our continued interest in the military, the Army and our ENCOM experiences. In these organizational reviews, we want to look at the support capabilities that these institutions provide to the individual, or assist in providing or support provided to military families. In this organization, the goals are lofty and concern government direction in support of the uniformed services. An example of the most recent MOAA email notice was concerning the military hospital consolidation under the Defense Health Agency and the need to not consolidate hospitals. This response was needed as COVID-19 identified the problems caused by bureaucratic centralization at the Federal level as entities become non-responsive.

We want to look beyond this role and examine their charitable and or support roles. These secondary roles for the organization developed over time and most are continuously growing in size as the military population grows and retires. To facilitate these activities the MOAA created a 501(c) (3) foundation. Through a network of chapters the MOAA maintains grassroots support at the local levels to work with local and national issues.

MOAA's purpose also has grown to include career transition assistance, improved member products, military benefits counseling, educational assistance to children of military families (to include enlisted), and strong involvement in military professionalism activities. Most of these activities are provided through two MOAA sub-organizations:

A) The MOAA Foundation

The MOAA Foundation creates, enhances, expands, and supports high-impact, proven-successful programs and services that enable the nation's uniformed service members and veterans of all ranks and their families to maintain a quality of life reflective of their selfless service to America. The foundation funds these programs and services through philanthropic contributions from the American people, corporations, MOAA members along with Councils and Chapters, those who seek to assist members of the military community, and additional organizations that support our mission.

B) The MOAA Scholarship Fund

The Military Officers Association of America (MOAA) established the MOAA Scholarship Fund in 1948 and to this day continues to provide education assistance to children of both officer and enlisted personnel. Those dependents who meet the requirements and qualifications to receive these scholarships and further educational assistance benefits encompass one of the association's founding principles: education is the cornerstone of a strong democracy. It is funded by donations from MOAA members, Councils and Chapters, corporations, and others with a desire to help military families.

Additional activities are available from MOAA. Membership in MOAA is helpful in gaining support, although not entirely essential. Spouses/dependent support can be provided where needs are present and other guidelines are met.

Educational Assistance is available in many forms. See if any fit your needs and if appropriate, apply.

Application Details and Requirements:

Applicants for a program must be planning to attend an accredited college or university as full-time students. All loans, scholarships, and grants are for students seeking their first undergraduate degree and are awarded for no more than five school years. No loans, scholarships, or grants are available for graduate-level studies.

General Eligibility: Applicants must be under 24 years old. Applicants must have a parent eligible for MOAA membership or be children of active duty, Reserve, National Guard, or retired enlisted military personnel. If the applicant served in a uniformed service before completing college, his or her maximum age for eligibility will be increased by the number of years he or she so served, up to five years. Applicants must have a high school GPA of 3.0 or higher. Children attending U.S. military academies and academy prep schools are not eligible. If selected for any Educational Assistance program, the sponsoring parent must have a paid MOAA membership throughout the college years and, if applicable, until the loan is repaid. Male applicants must affirm they have registered or will register for the Selective Service (by accepting the terms at the end of the application).

Selection Criteria: We evaluate students based of their scholastic ability (1/3), extracurricular activities (1/3), and financial need (1/3). The applicant provides this information in the online application.

Process: We notify semifinalists in mid-March, and they must submit supporting documentation. We notify finalists in early June, and they must submit proof of MOAA membership as appropriate and a fully executed promissory note.

a) Loans:

Interest-Free Loans: This is our main program. The interest-free loans are renewable annually for up to five years of full-time undergraduate study. The interest-free loan program currently provides a \$7,000 loan per student each year. Students selected as loan recipients and their sponsoring parent must sign a promissory note before receiving funds. We disburse funds electronically in two increments: one-half in early August and one-half in mid-December.

b) Scholarships:

American Patriot Scholarship: Limited to students who qualify for the interest-free loan program and whose military parent has died on active service or is receiving Traumatic Service members' Group Life Insurance (T-SGLI) payments. Currently, students receive scholarships of \$7,000 each school year.

c. Grants:

Designated Scholar Program: We consider all loan recipients for this program. Students chosen receive a \$6,500 interest-free loan and a \$500 grant named by the donor. Students must correspond with the donor or their designee each fall.

Senior Grants: We notify current loan recipients entering their final year in college of these grants in January of their junior year. Students who believe they are eligible for these grants and who do not receive an emailed link to the application should email edassist@moaa.org for additional information. Recipients of Senior Grants become ineligible for further Educational Assistance programs. The number of grants awarded varies from year to year.

General John Paul Ratay Educational Fund Grants: These grants are limited to children whose military parent retired and subsequently died. Students qualifying for a loan who meet the criteria of a Ratay grant are automatically considered. Students who believe they are eligible for these grants and who do not receive a request for supporting documentation should email edassist@moaa.org. Funding for this grant is limited, so we might not award these annually.

For other financial aid resources, and more information about MOAA member-only discounts on programs to prepare for college entrance exams such as the SAT and ACT, email edassist@moaa.org. Funding for this grant is limited, so we might not award these annually. We disburse scholarships and grants in early August. Students may only receive one type of Educational Assistance each school year.
